Her Honor

- Appointed to the MN Supreme Court by Governor Perpich in 1977 to fill an empty seat and won her next term on her own in a brutal election in which her troubled marriage and her gender were used against her
- Women in politics were routinely criticized for not paying enough attention to their children and husband. Women in the legal profession were routinely demeaned in the courtroom. Female victims of crime were often blamed for the crime perpetrated against them
- Rosalie suggested a systematic self-examination of the judiciary to root out discrimination against women. She led that gender task force and the subsequent actions to level those inequities (late 80s)
- She went on to lead a racial bias task force addressing issues that concerned both the Black community and the American Indian community



From Margot Livesey's "He Liked Custard"

I drive along the track, past the lake with its many swans, and park at the foot of Mount Helgafell. A narrow sheep path zigzags up the hillside through the long grass. Despite its name, Mount Helgafell is only a little over three hundred meters high, but it is famous as the home of Gudrun, a heroine of the Sagas. I climb slowly, taking in the ever-expanding view, occasionally startling a small, grubby sheep. Then, quite suddenly, there is nothing but broken rocks on all sides, and I am in the full blast of the wind that blows continuously over the many volcanoes, extinct and otherwise, of Iceland. Near the summit, I see the ruins of a small hut which my guidebooks variously describe as having belonged to a shepherd, a hermit, or some early Christian saint. I stand in its shelter to take photographs of the village of Stykkishólmur a few kilometers away, and the bay beyond. No one knows I am here, save the sheep and the ravens that circle overhead. I picture my heroine, Gemma Hardy, standing in just this place, hearing in the cry of the ravens the voice of her lost fiancé.

As a young writer, I was slow to realize that doing research is one of the deep pleasures of writing fiction. My early stories suffered from a surfeit of imagination and a paucity of accurate detail. To my youthful ears the very word research suggested dusty books, indexes, and crabbed notes. If I'd wanted to spend my days in the stacks of a library, I'd have stayed at university rather than becoming a waitress. Writing short stories, where often all that was needed was a glimpse of a combustion engine or one brief fact about breeding Pekingese dogs, allowed me to maintain my prejudices. I'd heard, too often, the old admonition: write what you know. I was slow to understand that research could allow me to know more. Slower still to understand that research has its own dangerous siren song.




Sweet Corn and Summer Squash Vichyssoise

serves 4 as a main dish or 6 as a first course

This soup has the golden hue of the sun from the use of three different yellow vegetables: slender summer squash, young sweet corn, and crisp yellow bell peppers. For robust flavor, pick up the corn from a farmers market or roadside country stand. The buttery broth comes from boiling the cobs with the rest of the ingredients to create a "corn milk." No cream is needed; just a touch of Greek yogurt will do. Served with a simple green salad, this vichyssoise becomes a lovely lunchtime meal that's sure to brighten your day.

1½ tablespoons butter
1 clove garlic, minced
1 cup chopped onion salt
1 heaping cup coarsely chopped summer squash (skin left on)
2½ cups raw sweet corn, cut from about 4 ears; reserve 3 cobs to use in the broth
½ cup chopped yellow bell pepper
1 medium potato, peeled and chopped
¼ teaspoon cayenne

1/4 teaspoon black pepper 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika 3 cups vegetable broth 2 tablespoons nonfat Greek yogurt 3 tablespoons lime juice minced cilantro for garnish In large stockpot, melt butter over medium heat. Add garlic and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Add onion and big pinch of salt. Cook, stirring, about 5 minutes, until softened. Stir in squash, corn, bell pepper, potato, another big pinch of salt, cayenne, and black pepper. Cook for about 3 minutes, then add vegetable broth and 3 corn cobs. Bring to a boil, then partially cover and cook for 20 minutes or until all vegetables are softened. Remove from heat; remove and discard cobs. Stir in yogurt and lime juice. Working in batches, puree until completely smooth. Add more salt or cayenne to taste. (With the correct amount of salt, the flavors will be bright.) Garnish with cilantro and serve. 



Along the way, Fritz, always eager to learn, unlocks secrets of his new homeland, from details of the river's geology and the area's animals to stories of brave stands against slavery and the dangers of flour milling. He befriends Margaret, a Métis girl whose family has called the region home for generations, and meets notable early settler Emily Goodridge Grey. Applying his developing stonecutting skills, he records these many lessons in the keystones of the bridge.


Working through the summer, Fritz grows in responsibility and stature. Best of all, soon after the bridge is complete, he is able to show off his handiwork to Momma in person.

Conflicted Mission

Faith, Disputes, and Deception on the Dakota Frontier Linda Clemmons

Contrasts the missionaries' rhetoric with the reality of their work on the frontier to tell a complicated and fascinating story of cultural collision.

Summary

From the mid-1830s to the 1860s, the missionaries sent to Minnesota by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions (ABCFM) wrote thousands of letters to their supervisors and supporters claiming success in converting the Dakota people. But author Linda M. Clemmons reveals that the reality of the situation was far more conflicted than what those written records would suggest.

In fact, in the rough Minnesota territory, missionaries often found themselves looking to the Dakota for support. The missionaries and their wives struggled to define what it meant to convert and "civilize" Dakota people. And, although many scholars depict missionaries as working hand in hand with the federal government, Clemmons reveals discord over the Dakota people's treatment, especially after the U.S.-Dakota War of 1862, when many missionaries spoke out against exile.

The missionaries found that work with the Dakota was rarely as heroic, romantic, or successful as what they read about in the evangelical press, but, at the same time, they themselves painted a rosier picture of their own work.

Vilhelm Moberg introduces four musicians on the last day that each one will ever know: a curmudgeonly fiddler from the 1930s, a sad and conscientious key-harp player from the plague era of 1711, a ne'er-do-well who plays the flute in 1545, and a goat-horn blower from prehistoric times who, like the others, only seeks happiness with a woman. Binding their stories together is the voice of the Bridal Spring itself, tart and grudgingly compassionate-and slow to reveal its secret.


Each progression backward in time reflects Moberg's rich knowledge of folklore and shows the changes in everyday life in Sweden's past. First published in 1946, before the Emigrants novels, The Brides of Midsummer is a complex, compelling journey through the whole arc of human life.

When Valter, a boy with great imagination, describes the exciting things he sees so vividly, he is punished for lying, so he learns to write his stories down instead. He willingly leaves school and helps support his family by working in lumber camps and a glass factory. His father's ill health and death bring even harder times. Through all his toil, he debates whether to honor his father's wish and remain in Sweden to support his mother.

With gentle irony and a loving knowledge of the landscape, the people, and the larger issue of class struggle, Moberg offers American readers a deeply moving view of the other side of Swedish immigration.
