

High up on my perch I can see all the way to the ocean; there is a nice breeze at my back. I look down at the beanbag, and think: I betcha Leo Penn ain't asking his stuntman to jump into any beanbag chairs! Any normal person would tell Chris Penn to come up and do it himself. Alas, I'm deeply competitive, an adrenaline junkie and never back down from a challenge. I'm also happy he has finally included me in one of the Penn—Sheen movie epics they've been filming all around the neighborhood. If I were to defer, I'm sure Sean or Charlie or Emilio would get the nod for this plum role.

"And ... action!" Chris yells, looking through the camera.

I glance at my brother, who turns away. Screw it, how bad could it be? I think, and I spring out, off my toes, facing away, but aiming for the beanbag, trying to clear the roof's overhang. I hit the beanbag dead center. I feel a snap in my ankle, followed by a white-hot pain. Immediately I know it's broken.

On some level you have to be crazy to be an actor. You must have a masochistic streak to deal with the rejection in failure and the unrelenting scrutiny in success. You must be able to shut off your logical brain, the voice that reminds you "two-thirds of the Screen Actors Guild makes less than \$1,000 a year, get a real job" or "don't jump off this roof, you moron!" But if acting truly is your calling, if it's really in your blood, you will have these tragic/heroic flaws in spades. And when you are filming a scene or a stunt, even for a seventh grade 8mm movie, and break an ankle, you won't ask for a doctor; you will ask: Did you get the shot? And if the answer is yes, there will be no more pain, only euphoria.







After World War I, black Americans fervently hoped for a new epoch of peace, prosperity, and equality. Black soldiers believed their participation in the fight to make the world safe for democracy finally earned them rights they had been promised since the close of the Civil War.

After the economic collapse of 2008, the polite-thinking world expected the right to be humbled by the disasters of the George W. Bush era, to confess their errors, and to make haste for the political center. The world expected penitence.


What it got was the opposite, delivered on the point of a bayonet. Conservative leaders solved the problem of the Bush years by excommunicating George W. Bush and renouncing his works. Instead of complying with the new speed limit, they hit the gas. Instead of tacking for the center, they sailed hard to the right, veering off on a quest for ideological purity. And instead of elevating their remaining centrists to positions of power, they purged them.

They doubled down on their catastrophic faith—and they won.

We are living through an era of privation that looks a lot like the Great Depression, yet the only really animated protest movement is one that demands precisely the opposite of what our ancestors demanded in the thirties. It gags on the unremarkable notion of "spreading the wealth around," insisting that the top-heavy manner in which wealth is currently distributed is the only truly American alternative. It revolts against the prospect of universal health care and it supports the harshest orthodoxy of the Hoover administration: "Let the failures fail." It even calls for the return of the gold standard.

We remember the 1930s as the heroic age of liberalism, but they were also a time when, in certain corners of the culture, "the will to believe often triumphed over the evidence of the senses," as one novelist put it. The politics of hard times are different today, but among the firebrands of the right, that old "will to believe" is with us again as powerfully as it was in 1932.

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

Economic catastrophe usually brings social protest and demands for change-or at least it's supposed to. But when Thomas Frank set out in 2009 to look for expressions of American discontent, all he could find were loud demands that the economic system be made even harsher on the recession's victims and that society's traditional winners receive even grander prizes. The American right, which had seemed moribund after the election of 2008, was strangely reinvigorated by the arrival of hard times. The Tea Party movement demanded not that we question the failed system but that we reaffirm our commitment to it. Republicans in Congress embarked on a bold strategy of total opposition to the liberal state. And TV phenom Glenn Beck demonstrated the commercial potential of heroic paranoia and the purest libertarian economics.

In Pity the Billionaire, Frank, the great chronicler of American paradox, examines the peculiar mechanism by which dire economic circumstances have delivered wildly unexpected political results. Using firsthand reporting, a deep knowledge of the American right, and a wicked sense of humor, he gives us the first full diagnosis of the cultural malady that has transformed collapse into profit, reconceived the Founding Fathers as heroes from an Ayn Rand novel, and enlisted the powerless in a fan club for the prosperous. What it portends is ominous for both our economic health and our democracy.

"Help us help you."

The man across the table was Amir Hamudi Hasan al-Sa'adi, chief scientific adviser to Saddam Hussein, an urbane, charismatic negotiator, equally eloquent in English and Arabic. He heard us and smiled. It was February 9, 2003, slightly less than three months since Hussein had re-admitted UN weapons inspectors to Iraq. I was making my third visit to Baghdad and this was the last evening. The Iraqi foreign minister had organized a dinner for the principal experts from the inspection teams and an assortment of Iraqi counterparts.


The restaurant was the finest the city could still offer. Baghdad's infrastructure was worn at the seams, showing the effects of a decade of sanctions. But the dinner service was elegant, the waitstaff gracious, the dark red linen tablecloths spotless. There was plenty of grilled fish, fresh from the Tigris River. And there was wine. That was a surprise. Alcohol was forbidden in public, but for this evening, for their out-of-town guests, the Iraqis had made an exception.

The dinner conversation had arrived at the critical theme: the UN's need for more cooperation, more documentation, particularly in the chemical and biological areas. You insist you have no weapons of mass destruction, we said. But we cannot close the WMD file where your records are incomplete. We need more evidence. *Help us help you*.

Sitting beside al-Sa'adi, Husam Amin, Iraq's weapons monitor, leaned forward to answer. "Let us be frank," he replied. "First, we cannot give you anything more, because there is nothing more to give." His glance shifted around the table. "But second, you cannot help us, because this war is going to happen, and nothing you or we can do will stop it. We both know that. Whatever we do, it is a done deal."

He sat back. Al-Sa'adi nodded, but said nothing.



When the UN's International Atomic Energy Agency elected an unknown lawyer as its director, few could have predicted the role Mohamed ElBaradei would play in the most high-stakes conflicts of our time. Contending with the Bush administration's assault on Iraq, the nuclear aspirations of North Korea, and the West's standoff with Iran, ElBaradei emerged as a lone independent voice, unique in maintaining credibility in the Arab world and the West alike. 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DESERT AMERICA

Boom and Bust in the New "New West"

Rubén Martínez

The economic boom—and the devastation left in its wake—has been writ nowhere as large as on the West, the most iconic of American landscapes. Over the last decade the West has undergone a political and demographic upheaval comparable only to the opening of the frontier. 



Whenever the political elite is caught in a crime, the same rationale is hauled out to justify its immunity. Prosecuting officials is too divisive. The country must look forward, not back. Politicians who break the law in the course of duty are well intentioned and do not deserve punishment. Political harmony trumps the need to enforce the law. Politicians forced out of office have suffered enough.

That is how Gerald Ford justified the act for which he was most widely praised: his pardon of Richard Nixon. And his line of reasoning, the need to ensure "domestic tranquility," has been used to protect lawbreaking leaders ever since. An excerpt from La Seduction:

"Tell me about seduction as if you were giving lessons to an American." I said to Arielle Dombasle one afternoon over tea.

Arielle told me to think about seduction as a battlefield of communication. "Seduction is transmitted substantially through words—what you say and what you decide to keep quiet about," she said. "Voilà. That's the key."

I had no idea what she meant. I asked her to explain. "You must choose your words carefully as you would in a war," she said. "The way you seduce depends on whether you want to win or you want to lose."

It could be a campaign to weaken your opponent by injecting an element of surprise, for example. "You could play against type to throw your adversary off balance," she said. "Seduction is not a frivolous thing. No. It's war."

Arielle explained that this war is nonviolent. That means the woman warrior must avoid the sort of traumatic exposure that comes with vulnerability in front of the adversary.

Nakedness is one such vulnerability. "Nudity is extremely violent, and you should never use it," she said. "Me, I would never walk naked in front of my husband. Never, never, never. You have to maintain a certain mystery."

"So you're only nude in the shower?" I asked.

"I'm nude when I'm alone, and I'm nude when I'm in his arms, but never in a sort of casually stupid gesture of the morning or whatever. Never."

"So nudity is not something trivial?"

"Of course not. But we know that."

I, too, must never be nude in front of my husband, she advised. "You shouldn't," she said. "Otherwise, he won't buy you lunch."

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In this eye-opening biography, the legal scholar and historian Paul Finkelman reveals how Millard Fillmore's response to the crisis he inherited set the country on a dangerous path that led to the Civil War.
