

A GUIDE FOR EDUCATORS Grades 2 & 3

This picture book shares the connection between all living things and fire. Readers will grasp that fire is basic and powerful, that it has the capability to both destroy and create, and that everything they know in the world has evolved with fire.

By learning the story of fire and how it has changed this planet, this book also addresses the question: Can people adapt to an increasingly fire-prone environment? This answer is: Yes, because they always have. *Fire Shapes the World* will allow children to explore their connection to this most elemental agent of change



Ecology

4. Find the image with the biologist in the burned forest. Draw and label a cause-and-effect illustration that shows how the beetle and woodpecker are connected. How are their life cycles the same? *NGSS 3-LS1-1*



5. Read the text on the page showing prehistoric people around a fire. What does the text explicitly say? What can readers infer from the text and images? *CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.CCRA.RI.1*


